

### **Newly Constructed ½-mile Horse Trail Connector for the Western States Trail**

(southwest of Chicken Hawk Staging Area)

Tevis Milepost 64, between Michigan Bluff and Foresthill

American River Ranger District, Tahoe National Forest

### **Background:**

During the past several years, there has been considerable congestion at the Chicken Hawk Veterinarian Checkpoint during the annual Tevis Cup. Everyone has agreed that more lateral space is needed at Chicken Hawk. The creative solution was to prepare a new connector trail, about one-half mile long, so that horses and riders can smoothly flow in one direction through the staging area.








The Ditch Witch Model SK-650 trail machine is owned by Greg Kimler of Echo Valley Ranch. This highly efficient trail machine is only 36-inches wide, and is powered by a 20-hp diesel engine. The hydraulic blade is controlled by levers and knobs at the rear of the machine where the operator stands on a small platform. The trail machine is estimated to be 20:1 more efficient in machine-time versus manual chopping.



Greg Kimler guides the route of the trail machine that is expertly piloted by Mike Shackelford, a retired Boeing 747 pilot, and AERC horseman.



At left: Safety helmets and gloves were used with a variety of tools: a Husqvarna long-bar hedge trimmer to remove blackberry vines and brush; a Pulaski axe to chop out roots; a MacLeod hoe to remove pine needles and create rolling grade-dips; and long-reach loppers to cut roots and brush.



At right: A remounting block in honor of WSTF past-President Bill Pieper was created from a fallen log. The nose was rounded-off, then the top was beveled to create a level platform and remove loose bark, then a MacLeod hoe created safe footing in mineral soil for the horse's hooves.

Greg Kimler is a U.S. Forest Service Class-C Faller (the highest sawyer classification) who pioneered the new Tevis Trail route with a long-bar chainsaw to cut fallen logs and brush-out vegetation. Greg was then followed by Michael Shackelford on an SK-650 Trail Machine to cut the new trail -bed down to mineral earth and remove large quantities of organic duff (pine needles, twigs, leaves, branches) that forms the forest soil. Geologist Robert Sydnor then followed-up with a Pulaski axe (to chop-out roots and stumps), a MacLeod hoe (to create rolling grade-dips, out-sloped for proper drainage), and a steel rake (to groom the surface of the new horse trail).







Greg Kimler, Mike Shackelford, and Robert Sydnor are credentialed as AERC Trail Masters of the American Endurance Ride Conference. The trail work was performed under written permit from the U.S. Forest Service, Tahoe National Forest, American River Ranger District in Foresthill. The trail work lasted for six days in May 2014.

On the last day of trail work, a ten-foot Husqvarna polesaw was used to cut overhanging tree limbs so that equestrians are not hit in the face.

AERC Trail Masters presciently remembered Julie Suhr's book-title: "Ten Feet Tall Still."

We could reach about twelve to thirteen feet high, and thus planned for future growth of limbs.






We then laid brush and small logs along the outside turns of the new trail so that horses are visually guided. Side-drainage swales are thereby concealed, and the horse's eyes focus on the proper trail route. In future years, grass will grow along the outside edge of the trail and the limbs will rot away.

After all trail-work was completed, the half-mile trail was carefully photographed (about every forty feet) using a GPS-tagged camera for scientific purposes, and also for future trail maintenance scheduling.

### Q and A Ask the Vet



# Q.

This year, I've switched my mare to overnight turnout so she can get a break from the sun (and bugs). She's in a stall with a fan during the heat of the day. She's handled this new schedule well so far, but I am curious whether it could disrupt her normal sleeping pattern. Horses being prey animals, I've heard they don't lay down unless they feel comfortable and unthreatened. Is it possible she will come to feel safe enough and lay down to sleep outside? Will she adapt to being a "night-shift" horse, or should I be concerned about her getting enough rest?



# A.

The patterns of sleep in horses are not fixed to day or night schedules. Most horses easily and quickly adapt to environmental and management changes in terms of their sleep functions. However, some do not. So potentially the turnout changes could lead to a problem. If there is an adaptive problem, then it takes two to four weeks to manifest. You've been on the new program all year, so if you haven't seen any differences in your mare then she has likely adapted well to the new change in management. That's a good thing.



# RELEASE AND HOLD HARMLESS AGREEMENT

The Undersigned assumes the unavoidable risks inherent in all horse-related activities, including but not limited to bodily injury and physical harm to horse, rider and spectator. The Undersigned acknowledges that horse-related activities are dangerous and that horses themselves have unpredictable temperaments which can sometimes cause injury. The Undersigned acknowledges that even the most experienced horse event sponsor, participant or horse owner cannot predict how each individual horse will react in a variety of situations and cannot guarantee my safety. THEREFORE, BY SIGNING BELOW, I KNOWINGLY ASSUME THE UNAVOIDABLE RISKS INHERENT IN ALL HORSE-RELATED ACTIVITIES, WHETHER KNOWN OR UNKNOWN, INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO BODILY INJURY AND PHYSICAL HARM TO HORSE, RIDER AND SPECTATOR, AND AGREE TO THE FOLLOWING ON BEHALF OF MYSELF AND MY SPOUSE, IF ANY:

1.
