

Introduction

The High Meadows Trail along a full-width graveled road (U.S.F.S. Road #12N21) is a high-altitude trail into the grassy High Meadows (elevation 7,740 feet), Star Lake, and access to the southeastern sector of the Tahoe Rim Trail. This is not in the USFS wilderness area, so there is no permit needed for day rides. The High Meadows Trail is quite steep, so it is a rigorous conditioning ride for horses. There are several locations for equestrian drinking. The High Meadows Trail provides access to Star Lake (elevation 9,120 feet) and Freel Peak (elevation 10,881).



Trailheads and Logistics

The High Meadows Trail is not often utilized by equestrians, and the reason is lack of a horse assembly area and full-sized trailhead with turning radius for horse trailers.


Access is from Pioneer Trail, a major paved boulevard that connects South Lake Tahoe with the town of Myers on Highway 50 and 89. There are suburban residential communities where the Cold Creek and High Meadows trail system connects to roads. Local residents often hike on these USFS trails which are in their backyards.

One public entry location (not really a trailhead) is on Quartz Street at Lake Alice Road, where there is space for one horse trailer.

Another public entry is on High Meadows Trail (a paved residential street) at Sierra House Elementary School with several possibilities for horse-trailer parking on Sierra House Trail (a paved residential street) and Marshall Trail (a paved residential street). Sorry about the nomenclature confusion between a "Trail" that is a paved residential street, and a "trail" that is hiking, equestrian, and mountain-biking trail.

It is *not* recommended to take a horse-trailer into the High Meadows Trailhead because there is *no* turn-around space and *no* parking space for truck & trailers. Park on a paved residential road (do not block driveways), and simply ride your horse another half-mile into the beginning of the trail system. There are no amenities, meaning: no hitching posts, no horse watering troughs, no restrooms, and only one bulletin board. But the High Meadows Trail is a great access route into the high-altitude trail system of southeastern Lake Tahoe.

The upper (=eastern) segment of the Cold Creek Trail is **not safe for horses** because of dropoffs and boulders. It is a double-black diamond trail (=possible injury) for mountain-bikers.

This helps to keep sediment out of Lake Tahoe. Remember the aphorism: "Keep Tahoe Blue." *At right*: the junction with the Star Lake Trail and access to the Tahoe Rim Trail.

Q and A Ask the Vet



Q. After a recent ride, I picked up my horse's hoof and found that the frog was hanging off. I've included a photograph I took of it. Why is my horse's frog falling off, and what should I do about it? Is he okay?

A. The picture reflects a normal process in the horse's foot called exfoliation. Many people understand exfoliation in terms of human skin cells whereby dead cells are chemically or mechanically removed to improve the aesthetic look of the skin. The horse's sole and frog are

similar in their cellular makeup to skin and therefore undergo a process whereby older cells "shed" over time.

The process involves the outward migration of epidermal cells that slowly die and accumulate keratin. Keratin holds the dead cells together into a structural, protective, tough covering like a Band-Aid. In most cases, exfoliation of the frog goes unnoticed or is seen when the farrier trims the feet. (It's also what the dog likes to eat after your farrier's visit!)

In certain environmental conditions, however, this structural covering will "shed" or exfoliate all at once or in a large piece. Much like a snake shedding its skin, the appearance can be very similar to the live anatomical structure and can therefore be concerning. If there is some retention of tissue in the normal process of exfoliation, as in this picture, then the process can be attenuated by trimming away the remaining dead keratinized frog. \$375 per person, all inclusive. Bunkhouse and horse rental extra.






